Today we held a special remembrance assembly and remain forever grateful to those who died in the line of duty. Thank you all for raising money for the Poppy Appeal.

## Safeguarding

## Assemblies

On Mondays we have our British Values Assembly; here is our theme this week - **British Value - Individual Liberty.**

We can take responsibility for our money and make choices about how to spend or save it. We have been learning about our needs (family, food, drink and shelter) and our wants at different ages to consider how money is spent, how much items cost and how we can save money.

Support your children in their understanding of money by;

1. Putting toys on selling sites that children don't use anymore to make some money.
2. Visit charity shops for some great finds
3. Ask children to plan meals, cost them and give them a budget.
4. Look for alternatives to see differences in prices and what you get for your money
5. Give children money to count
6. Look at differences between coins and notes



On Thursdays we have our Safeguarding Assembly; here is the theme this week - **Years 1 & 2 - Safe Touch, Years 3,4,5 and 6 - Positive Body Image.**

Years 1 and 2 children learned about safe touch. This has developed their understanding of who might touch us and the ways they may need to touch us to keep us safe, happy and healthy such as hugging, pats on the back or removing a splinter, as well as knowing when touch may be inappropriate and to talk to a safe adult if they are worried.

Years 3,4,5 and 6 focused on positive body image, feeling confident and being happy with ourselves whilst also understanding and accepting that people may be different to us in lots of ways. Please take the time to talk to your child about what they have learned.
