Please bring your children to school - if they are unwell contact will be made.

Dangerous Dogs



bring fun and happiness to family life

No one expects their dog to bite, no one expects their child to be seriously injured but children are more likely to be bitten at home, by a familiar dog.

Dogs are animals and will react in the only way they know how if they feel they have no other option.

Happy dog

A calm, happy dog is less likely to react unsafely to children's natural excitement

Give your dog a safe space of their own where they can go if they need time out

Close supervision

Teach your child to be calm and kind with your dog.

Avoid shouting, teasing or restrictive cuddler Stay close, watch and listen when your child and dog are together.

Understand your dog's body language so u can spot the signs when they start to stressed and intervene.

Trigger times

Teach your child to leave your dog alone when they are sleeping, eating, having a treat or playing with their tows.

Adapting your family life

As your family grows and your children become older, changes in your house may

As children become more mobile, consider stair gates to separate your dog and child.

Continue to teach your children how to act around animals.

If you're worried about your dog's behaviour, speak to your vet or a dog behaviourist - early advice and intervention could save a life.



being a responsible dog owner...

As a responsible dog owner there a few things you must be aware of and consider for everyone's safety

- It's against the law to let a dog be dangerously out of contro anywhere, including in a public place, in a private place, for example, a neighbour's house or garden and in the owner's home.
- If your dog is out of control you may be prosecuted, face up to six months in prison and be given a fine of up to £5,000.
- If your dog bites somebody, in or outside of your home, you may be prosecuted and sent to prison for up to five years for causing injury and up to six months where on injury has been a utained.
- The court also has the power to order the dog to be destroyed disqualify you from owning or keeping dogs and order you to now a sheterifial compensation to the victim.
- If your dog bites or injures an assistance dog (e.g. a guide dog your can be sent to origon for up to these years or fined.)
- If your dog attacks, or is deemed to be a danger to postal workers, deliveries to your address and that of your neighbour may be suppended. Postal companies treat all dog attacks on their staff very seriously and will seek to prosecute dog owner
- if you rent your property, failure to keep your dog under control
- You must report all dog bites to the police, regardless of h serious they are via 101 or 999 in an emergency.

Concerned about a dog in your community?

Questions you have asked...

When do books need to be in schools?

Books should be in school daily to allow the children to read the same book at home as they do at school.

When are books changed?

Books are changed on a Monday.

My child has read their book, why is it not being changed?

We encourage children to read and re-read their books to build their fluency and confidence

Do I have to send reading slips?
We use these to track reading at home and they go towards whole class numbers for the competition.



Help your child with reading

I Spy

Play 'I Spy' games. Can you find words beginning with...? Can you find a picture of a ...? How many ... can you see?

Ask Questions

Ask questions about the story as you read it e.g. What is the story about? Why do you think they made that choice? Was it a good choice? Why did that happen? What do you think will happen next? What was your favourite part of the story? Why?

Make it Fun

Enjoyreadingtogether. Give characters funny voices and engage with the pictures. Make a game out of finding words that rhyme or start with the same sound.

Be Seen

Make sure you are seen reading. Keep books magazines at easy reach.

Get Out

Go to your public library regularly. Find the books you loved as a kid to read together.

Create

Use reading to inspire drawings or new stories.

Go Online

Look online & in app stores for appropriate word & spelling games.

Make Space

Have a special place or a certain time when you read together.



Read everything out loud.

Books, poems, nursery rhymes, newspaper & magazine articles, food labels... anything that is close to hand!
